

"Focus on the Finish Line"

Reflections on I Corinthians 9: 24 - 27

In the Epistle set for today, Paul says, "In a race all runners run, but only one gets the prize... [so] run in such a way to get the prize." (*I Corinthians 9:24*) These words remind us of the words of Jesus – that many are called but few are chosen (*Matthew 22:14*).

Paul reminds us that "Everyone who competes in the games goes into strict training" (v. 25). The serious athlete engages in all-consuming preparation for completion; preparation which is relentless, focused, determined and intentional.

The Christian life is not a sprint; rather, it is a marathon. There are times when we become discouraged and tired. At such times "He gives strength to the weary and increases the power of the weak... those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength... they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint." (Isaiah 40:29-31) So, run dear Christians and "Focus on the Finish Line!"

Pre-Lenten Season

As the Church moves through the Christian Year from Epiphany to Lent she passes through three Sundays, which hold strange titles for modern ears: Septuagesima, Sexagesima, and Quinquagesima are in fact three Latin words which indicate how far away we are from Easter – that is, 70, 60 and 50 days respectively. From the 5th century these Sundays emerged as a preparatory cycle for Lent

Septuagesima

Liturgical Trivia

Septuagesima means 'seventieth' in Latin and it makes less than seventy days before Easter.

Spiritually, the seventy days from Septuagesima to Easter represent our exile from God. In his work on the Liturgical Year, Dom Gueranger explains the Scriptural contrast between Jerusalem and Babylon.

Babylon is the image of this world of sin, in the midst whereof the Christian has to spend his years of probation; Jerusalem is the heavenly country, where he is to repose after all his trials.

Following the liturgical changes of the 1960s, the Church did away from the ancient season of Septuagesima. This was to avoid confusion because it often seemed like Lent – the priest wore purple, the alleluia was forbidden. The focus turned to the journey to Calvary. This revision returns Lent to its original unity and significance.

Septuagesima was regarded as a beginning, and so, in monasteries, the readings began from Genesis. **† THE WORLD** Continue to pray for thosel places in the world experiencing conflict and for all displaced from their homes.

[†] THE WORLDWIDE CHURCH Today the Church worldwide remembers the martyrs of Japan. They were Christians who were persecuted for their faith in Japan, mostly during the 17th century. On February 5, 1597, twenty-six Christians—six European Franciscan missionaries, three Japanese Jesuits and seventeen Japanese laymen including three young boys—were executed by crucifixion in Nagasaki. • Thanksgiving for the ministry of Titus *Evangelist, companion of Paul* (commemorated 6th February.) • In the *Anglican Communion* for The Church in Papua New Guinea and the Rt Revd Nathan Ingen.

Narayan Vaman Tilak was a renowned Marathi poet and a social reformer. He is loved throughout Maharashtra as "the poet of children and flowers". He was born Karajgaon village in Ratnagiri. Tilak was disappointed with the caste system. He was drawn to the teachings of the Gospels and after a series of life changing events he decided to be a follower of Jesus Christ in 1895. Tilak introduced using "Bhajans" and "Kirtan" in to the Marathi church enriching their devotional life by the art form familiar to them. Tilak mostly lived in the town of Ahmadnagar and served the Church as a preacher for about 24 years, until his death in 1919. In Ahmednagar he founded the Marathi magazine Dnyanodaya which is still being issued today.
