

Reflections on the Parable of the Sower

"God tosses great handfuls of seed and then waits, as a farmer must for the rains to come, for the seeds to sprout, for the crop to return seed to the sower and bread to the eater.

Where do you and I spread God's Word, grace, love, forgiveness? Do we look out for some good soil so it will grow quickly? Or do we purposely let it fall in all kinds of places, to all sorts of people?

Is God's Word, which we have received, only for our well-prepared portion of God's world? Or is it instead especially for those places in which people live being choked by cares and suffering, where people's preparation for the Good News is shallow, for people whose hearts have been hardened by doubt and cynicism? What kind of seed sowers are we? And where and to whom do we sow?

Pre-Lenten Season

As the Church moves through the Christian Year from Epiphany to Lent she passes through three Sundays, which hold strange titles for modern ears:

Septuagesima, Sexagesima, and Quinquagesima are in fact three Latin words which indicate how far away we are from Easter – that is, 70, 60 and 50 days respectively. From the 5th century these Sundays emerged as a preparatory cycle for Lent

This week, our prayers are first for all those in Turkey and Syria following two large earthquakes and hundreds of aftershocks. The death toll has passed 11,500 so we can assume a hundred times that number will suffer some effects, relatives worldwide, rescue workers, aid agency staff trying to muster and distribute resources, workers trying to restore power and supplies, and a huge clean-up effort to come. Amid the devastation and grief, we pray people will be able to pause and acknowledge God's presence and find their strength in His power and love for their journey ahead. • We continue to pray for a path to peace for Ukraine and a desire for peace in Russian leadership.
• We grieve the findings in the downing of Malaysian Airlines Flight MH17 in 2014, with Russian leadership implicated, and pray that the close of the investigation will bring some resolution and subdue not heighten the grief of those whose relatives were killed.

† OUR COUNTRY In her speech when presenting the Union Budget the Finance Minister spoke of "....a prosperous and inclusive India, in which the fruits of development reach all regions and citizens." Pray that the fruits of economic growth percolate to the poorerst of the poor in our country. Pray for all those whose decisions affects the lives of many.

† THE WORLDWIDE CHURCH Later this week the Church commemorates Martin Luther on his death anniversay, (18th February). Remembering Luther's role in the Reformation should bring us back to what the Reformers wanted to put at the centre of every person's life, which is a simple trust in Jesus Christ. • In the Anglican Communion for The Episcopal Church in the Philippines and the Most Revd Brent Alawas.

† THE CHURCH IN INDIA We remember with thanksgiving the ministry of two missionaries this week. The 19th century Scottish Presbyterian missionary, Alexander Duff (commemorated 12th February) was a pioneer of Christian education in India and a foremost leader of the world missionary movement of his day. • The 18th century Lutheran evangelist Christian Frederick Schwartz (commemorated 13th February) had a profound influence in South India. The World Day of Prayer

"I Have Heard About Your Faith" ~ Ephesians 1: 15 - 19

World Day of Prayer is celebrated on the first Friday of March each year to encourage Christian women to engage in personal prayer and lead communal prayer within their mission auxiliaries and associations. The origins of the World Day of Prayer date back to the 19th century.

The theme this year is based on Ephesians 1:15-19, the letter sent to a faith community to express gratitude. Paul gave thanks to God for the Ephesians living out their love and faith, and prayed that they could see these three truths: the hope to which God has called the disciples, the riches of God's glorious inheritance among the saints, and the immeasurable greatness of God's power.

The World Day of Prayer 2023 service has been put together by the ladies of the churches in Taiwan. The inter-denominational national committee led by YWCA includes representatives from other denominations (including the Catholic church) and church organizations.
