† **THE WORLD** We pray for freedom from fear for school pupils in Nigeria, and especially for the safe return of the many who have been abducted during the past weeks by gunmen hoping for a ransom • Opportunistic pirates off the coast of Somalia have seized a cargo ship and captured its crew, so we pray against violent and illegal actions there and in the Red Sea, and for the peace of God to reign • Our continued and fervent prayers for lasting peace in the Holy Land and an end to the war between Russia and Ukraine.

† **OUR COUNTRY** Pray for our country in the run-up to general elections.

† **THE WORLDWIDE CHURCH** For the Church universal as we prepare for our journey to Calvary during Holy Week • Today the Church commemorates Patrick of Ireland (Bishop, Evangelist). He was consecrated a bishop and began preaching the Gospel throughout Ireland. Kings, their families, and entire kingdoms converted to Christianity when hearing Patrick's message • Cyril of Jerusalem (Bishop, theologian) is commemorated on 18th March. Cyril was a distinguished theologian of the early Church (ca. 313 – 386). He is highly respected in the Palestinian Christian Community. He wrote 24 lectures which are the earliest record of the systematic teaching of the Church on the creed and the Sacraments. Cyril became well known for his charitable works in the City of Jerusalem. Cyril followed in the example of St. Augustine where the bishop fed the poor even by means of selling the church treasury • The sixth century monk Benedict is commemorated on 21st March. He is the patron saint of Europe and students. Benedict's main achievement is his 'Rule', containing precepts for his monks. The Rule of Benedict became one of the most influential religious rules in Western Christendom. For this reason, Benedict is often called the founder of Western Christian monasticism • In the *Anglican Communion* for The Church in Wales and the Most Reverend Andrew John.
