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ASCENSION SUNDAY

* * *

Ascension Day, which falls 40 days after Easter (this year on 29th May), marks the end of the 'greater days' of Eastertide and forms a watershed from which we can look back to Jesus' Resurrection and forward to the gift of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. By the fourth century in Asia Minor, the Ascension had become separated from the feast of Pentecost, following the chronology found in Luke's account in Acts, and was celebrated on the fortieth day after the Resurrection. It was seen as an enthronement festival, celebrating Christ as Lord of heaven and earth, themes which were subsequently developed in the Festival of Christ the King which now creates a climax to the whole Christian Year.

One of the mysteries of the Ascension is that Christ's being taken into heaven does not imply his absence from the Church. That insight has perhaps led to the more recent emphasis during the latter 10 days of Eastertide on the preparation for the gift of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. However, the earlier focus, as expounded in a sermon of St Augustine, is that Christ's entrance into heaven prepares a way for his followers: we 'are already in heaven with him, even though what is promised us has not yet been fulfilled in our bodies.' The Collect in the Book of Common Prayer for Ascension Day is entirely consistent with this tradition.

The Ascension Reading

Acts 1: 1 - 11

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

In the first book, Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus did and taught from the beginning until the day when he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. After his suffering he presented himself alive to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them over the course of forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God. While staying with them, he ordered them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for the promise of the Father. 'This', he said, 'is what you have heard from me; for John baptized

with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now.' So when they had come together, they asked him, 'Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.' When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. While he was going and they were gazing up towards heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. They said, 'Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up towards heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven.'

Nine day Prayer Cycle from Ascension to Pentecost

A new community had been born in the death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus. They had been given one task: to be Christ's witnesses to the ends of the earth. Pentecost would show that in God's plan of salvation there were to be no barriers of language or culture; everyone must hear the Good News of forgiveness and eternal life in their own tongue, a dialect they understood. It wasn't that they had to learn the language of the church; but, by the power of the Holy Spirit, that the church was sent to learn to share Christ in words the world would understand.

The session was led by the Most Revd Bijaya Kumar Nayak (Moderator and Bishop of Agra). The gathering saw delegates participating from all 28 dioceses of CNI. Representatives from our Diocese (including our Presbyter) participated to celebrate the importance of prayer in individual, family, and church life.

The Sunday after the Ascension:

A Collect Reflection

(excerpt from an article by Sarah Lindsay)

O God, the King of glory, you have exalted your only Son Jesus Christ with great triumph to your kingdom in heaven: Do not leave us comfortless, but send us your Holy Spirit to strengthen us, and exalt us to that place where our Saviour Christ has gone before; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, in glory everlasting. Amen.

The Collect for the Sunday after Ascension

* * *

This time in the Church Year we remember Christ's ascension, next week we celebrate Pentecost and the giving of the Holy Spirit, and then we enter the second half of the church year: ordinary time. Ordinary time takes its name from the ordinal numbers that mark the weeks after Pentecost — the first Sunday after Pentecost, the second Sunday, etc. — but it's also an ordinary season, a season for growing and working and living in this in-between space separating the resurrection and the return of Christ.

Surely it must have felt like loss to Jesus' companions, who had seen Jesus leave them once before; no wonder that they anticipated his second coming within their lifetimes. It can also feel like loss to us today, two millennia later, like an empty house after the guests have gone or a return to daily life after the excitement of travel. The waiting and the celebrating are over, leaving a gap in our lives.

Today's collect reminds us, though, that we are not left alone or left comfortless.

Jesus has been exalted to heaven, but as he promised his disciples he is sending the Holy Spirit. And through the work of the Holy Spirit, we have the hope that one day we, too, will be exalted to be with Jesus forever.

And so on this Sunday, between the Ascension (celebrated last Thursday) and Pentecost, we can take time to transition from the highs of Eastertide into ordinary time. Jesus has ascended and we remain here on earth, but he promises that we will one day join him and, until then, we have the Holy Spirit with us. **† THE WORLD** We continue to pray for an end to violence in all wartorn regions of the world, for wisdom for leaders of the nations, and for those agencies who are working to assist those who have been affected by war and unrest.

† OUR COUNTRY Pray for the safety of all who guard our borders and shores. We thank God for the onset of the monsoons.

[†] **THE WORLDWIDE CHURCH** As we await the gift of the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost (8^h June) we pray for the worldwide Church. May there be unity and goodwill among different denominations • The martyrs of Uganda (1886) are remembered on 3rd June. They were Christian converts who were murdered for their faith in the historical kingdom of Buganda, now part of Uganda in East Africa • The 19th century pastor, Pyari Mohan Rudra is commemorated on 4th June. He was a Bengali Christian convert and the father of Sushil Kumar Rudra, who later became a prominent figure in the Indian independence movement. Pyari Mohan converted to Christianity in 1860, influenced by the Scottish missionary Alexander Duff, and later became a missionary himself, working with the Church Mission Society in Calcutta and rural Bengal • Boniface (Bishop, Evangelist and Martyr 754) is commemorated on 5th June • In the Anglican Communion for the Anglican Church of Korea and the Most Revd Onesimus Dongsin Park.
